

DOJ Releases Huge New Epstein Files With Multiple Mentions of Trump — Live Updates and Analysis

Political and Public Reaction

Photos, Evidence, and Graphic Content

The newly released tranche includes:

- Photos from Epstein's properties and personal collections.

While images and files might show former presidents, business leaders, or cultural figures, **listing in these files does not amount to evidence of criminal conduct** by those pictured. The files are raw investigative materials, not indictments.

Legal Framework: Epstein Files Transparency Act

The **Epstein Files Transparency Act**, passed unanimously by Congress and signed into law in late 2025, requires the DOJ to release all unclassified documents related to Epstein's federal investigations within a set timeframe.

This law was designed to enhance accountability and give survivors and the public fuller visibility into how federal agencies handled the Epstein and Maxwell cases. However, disagreements over compliance and redactions continue.

What's Next: Ongoing Releases and Public Access

The Justice Department has stated that **additional document releases are planned**, and remaining materials will be made public in the coming weeks, after review and redaction protocols are complete.

- **Further mentions of Trump or other public figures.**
