

Five Nights at Freddy's 2 Smashes Box Office Records as Fans Rally Behind the Sequel

The horror genre just delivered one of its most surprising success stories of the year. *Five Nights at Freddy's 2*, the follow-up to Universal and Blumhouse's hit videogame-inspired thriller, stormed into North American theaters with an astonishing **\$63 million opening weekend**, wildly surpassing industry expectations. Yet *Five Nights at Freddy's 2* upended that long-standing pattern. With its **\$63 million** opening haul, the film has now secured the record for the **largest post-Thanksgiving debut ever**, outpacing previous titles that benefitted from far less competition. Exhibitors reported packed theaters across major markets, particularly during evening and late-night showtimes as fans flocked in groups to experience the movie together.

The sequel also notched the **biggest PG-13 opening of 2025**, a noteworthy feat in a year where several mid-budget genre films struggled to find traction. In addition, it became the **second-largest horror opening of 2025**, trailing only another high-profile franchise release earlier in the year. For a film with a moderate price tag and no day-and-date streaming model, the performance signals a major win for theatrical-first distribution.

Critics Pan the Film, but Audiences Overwhelmingly Embrace It

While ticket buyers turned out in droves, critics were far less enthusiastic. Reviews skewed heavily negative, with many calling the film unfocused or overly reliant on fan service. One particularly harsh critic described it as an “incoherent mess,” arguing that it failed to build on the strengths of the first installment.

Yet the audience reaction told a completely different story.

According to PostTrak data, **70% of moviegoers said they would “definitely recommend” the film** to others—an unusually strong endorsement for a horror sequel, especially one that received poor reviews. Crowds reported enjoying the atmosphere, the thrill of watching with fellow fans, and the continuation of the mythos that has defined the *Five Nights at Freddy’s* video game universe for over a decade.

The enthusiastic reception reinforces the franchise’s unique cultural position. Like other dedicated fandom-driven brands, including *Scream*, *Saw*, and *Paranormal Activity*, *Five Nights at Freddy’s* is largely critic-proof. The franchise thrives on its mystery-driven lore, iconic animatronics, and community-driven excitement, giving it a longevity many studios are eager to replicate.

A Smart Budget and Theatrical-Only Strategy Pay Off

The film’s production budget is reported to be around **\$36 million**, a relatively conservative figure for a studio horror sequel with heavy animatronic effects and action set pieces. Thanks to its explosive opening weekend, the movie is already on the fast track to profitability. Ticket sales from just three days in North America have nearly doubled the production spending, and worldwide totals are expected to push the film into blockbuster status well before the end of its theatrical run.

The strategic shift in distribution also played a critical role. Unlike the first *Five Nights at Freddy’s* movie—which launched simultaneously in theaters and on streaming—the sequel opted for **an exclusive theatrical release**, eliminating any competing viewing options and creating a “must-see-in-theater” urgency among fans. The result: a stronger debut than most analysts projected and a clear indicator that the franchise still commands a powerful presence on the big screen.

How the Sequel’s Opening Compares to the First Film

The first *Five Nights at Freddy's* adaptation debuted in 2023 with an enormous **\$80 million opening weekend**, one of the biggest ever for a horror film. That achievement was even more remarkable given the film's same-day streaming availability, which typically dilutes theatrical turnout.

While the sequel opened slightly lower at \$63 million, the circumstances were entirely different. Without a streaming component and released in a slower box-office window, *Five Nights at Freddy's 2* demonstrated the franchise's enduring pull. While *Five Nights at Freddy's 2* easily claimed the top spot, the rest of the weekend box-office chart featured a mix of holdovers and seasonal titles. Family films continued to draw younger audiences, and early December releases maintained steady momentum. Despite competition, none came close to matching the surge generated by the horror sequel.
